# Thornborough Village Hall Annual Review and Chairman's Report -June 2024



## **Prime Objective:**

The village hall management committee have met their prime objective of keeping Thornborough Village Hall open for use by villagers and village organisations.

#### Income:

Our normal income to the year ending March 2024 was £9,899 from 2 main sources; **lettings** (£6,835) and **the 59 Club** (£3,045). **The 59 Club** subscriptions have increased following a concerted effort from the committee to sign up new participants (2023: £2,305). There are **still a few spaces available** – please **contact one of the Committee** if you wish to support us in this way **or head to our 59 Club page on the Thornborough Village Hall website:**

We have also managed to secure a few new regular repeat bookings which give the Hall much needed visibility in terms of future revenue.

We are very grateful for the continued support from the TPC and their annual £1,000 grant.

## **Grant Applications:**

During the past year, we have successfully applied for and been granted £6,400 toward the new infrared heating system and a further £85,700 toward the general refurbishment. These amounts have been supplemented so far with £15,000 from the Fundraisers Group (and still more to come) due to their tireless efforts in running the many events the village enthusiastically supports. Thank you to everyone!

## **Refurbishment:**

Following the installation of the damp proof course during early 2023, we installed new efficient heating in time for the winter. After a few hiccups, this system now works well and is remotely controlled so can easily be switched on or off for each booking.

Work is now well underway on improving the kitchen, toilets and storage facilities, and Liz Julier and Sue Kenyon are finalising the 'accessorising' details in terms of crockery, curtains and new furniture specifications. I'm sure the whole village will be delighted with their new look hall when completed. A special mention to Sue Kenyon who is ably managing this project for us.

Once the refurbishment is completed, we will have invested in excess of  $\pm 125,000$  in the hall since March 2023. Both the committee and the fundraisers should be incredibly proud of what their combined efforts have achieved.

## Accessibility Audit:

During the year we commissioned a full accessibility audit of the hall and its' facilities in order to ensure we are compliant with current regulations, and to also provide us with recommendations on practical improvements to improve our community inclusivity. Some of these recommendations have been included within the refurbishment and others will be part of an ongoing programme. Our thanks go to Steve Coppins for leading this project.

#### Broadband:

Despite many unfulfilled assurances, we eventually secured high speed fibre broadband from Gigaclear for the hall on a free of charge basis. This has since been networked to both the school and the church and will be free to use for all.

Finally, I would like to express my thanks to the Committee for all their help and support, to David Telford for his work as Honorary Treasurer, to Liz Julier for her role as Hon. Sec, and to Steve Coppins for his detailed efforts in securing the FCC grant.

# Reflections from the Rectory by Rev'd Jacqueline Dove

During my ordination Bishop Steven addressed us with these words: "....Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness.... Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged."

With the help of God's Holy Spirit my heart is daily enlarged as I easily see the image of God in those I minister too. I therefore find it heartbreaking that often those who have suffered a run of tragic loss feel it must be because they have done something wrong, that somehow they have brought it upon themselves. The truth is bad things happen to good people and the unfairness of this galls our sense of justice. So, we can either harden our hearts against God for allowing this injustice or take the blame ourselves. We are wired as humans to make sense of things, and so we want to give meaning to suffering, for it to at least have some kind of purpose. Libraries are full of books trying to make sense of how an all-powerful, loving God allows senseless suffering. I think we don't really know the answer to this all-important question.

Perhaps instead of blaming God or blaming ourselves, we can accept that bad things happen to good people without understanding why. Loving-kindness *("Hesed")* is God's primary response to suffering and, with the help of God, it can be ours too. I find that in response to suffering, God's Holy Spirit moves me to weep, like those at the 'weeping wall' in Jerusalem as I mourn with those who mourn. Christians believe that God came down from heaven and 'pitched his tent' amongst us and experienced this suffering first hand. God on a cross is perhaps the closest we get to any kind of answer. Being with those who are suffering perhaps is the answer.

The suffering which comes hand in hand with being vulnerable humans, who are not always in control of what happens to us, is compounded by the suffering caused by selfishness, by the absence of loving-kindness. There is also the suffering caused by the abuse of power and oppressive systems. Suffering is a given. Rather than trying to make sense of it, the more important question is how do we respond to it. Do we harden our hearts and turn our back on God and others or do we allow it to break our hearts wide open that our "hearts may daily be enlarged. "

The league is very tight this year and there is no reason why we shouldn't attain our objective if we hold our nerve. The A team have achieved a level of consistency that had eluded them in recent seasons. Their efforts mean that they now stand an excellent chance of winning promotion.

Meanwhile, the inaugural season of the Club's new suite of youth teams has been a triumph under the indefatigable helmsmanship of Michael Ballinger, Daniel Harrison and their many helpers. # Thornborough Parish Council (TPC) Report on Thornborough Village Pond & Biodiversity by Cllrs Richard Dove, Lynn Morgan July 24

TPC is pleased to report that following the Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust "BBOWT" Survey completed last Autumn on our Village Pond we have a good start in improving Biodiversity in Thornborough. As you are aware, the Pond is a focal point in the Village. The survey was to provide expert opinion on the Pond as a habitat for wildlife and we were delighted to find out that the work required to improve the Pond is far less intrusive than originally anticipated.

The response to our questionnaire circulated to all residents in the Parish in preparation for the Annual Parish Assembly in May 2024 has also provided TPC with encouraging support in improving Biodiversity in the Parish.

Our Biodiversity Policy states 'The Parish Council will, wherever possible, raise public awareness of biodiversity issues. It will, where possible, involve the community in biodiversity projects to maintain and improve the local environment. The Parish Council will communicate and raise awareness of biodiversity through its website and Parish communications'.

We are a few steps ahead in implementing our biodiversity policy with the wildlife habitats provided by the Village Pond, Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) in Pilch Lane, and Thornborough & Coombs Woodlands. We now need to move forward by taking up the offers of help as provided via the questionnaires, begin to identify where individuals are already improving habitats in their gardens and offer guidance and help where this has been requested.

First steps forward in improving biodiversity in Thornborough:

- TPC representatives to attend BBOWT 'Achieving Diversity' conference in Aylesbury in September 2024.
- The WI (Women's Institute) are hoping to arrange an open talk on encouraging biodiversity in 2025 that would be open to anyone (male or female) that would like to attend.
- TPC will be following up on offers from residents to test pond water samples, identification of birds and insects, (with training to be arranged if needed).
- TPC to seek grant funding for information boards by the Pond, and a larger Community Noticeboard by the Village Hall.
- Individual offers of help with Work parties to be followed up and dates to be arranged and publicised.
- Areas of possible wildflower seeding to enhance pollen opportunities for bees and other insects to be identified.

We hope that you have enjoyed the view down the pond from the bridge by the village hall which resulted from trimming back the trees during our last Pond Work Party in June.





The stream outside the School was also cleared of dominant rushes to keep the water flowing and to allow other water plants to flourish. A repair to the 'bung' which controls the outflow from the pond was also carried out.

# Thornborough Parish Council (TPC) Report

TPC has met twice since the previous edition of the newsletter was published on 19 June and 16 July. The minutes of both meetings are available on our website: <u>https://www.thornboroughparish.org.uk/Agendas\_and\_Minutes\_36577.aspx</u>.

#### Thornborough Community Resilience (emergency planning)

TPC was pleased to note, and would like to say thank you, for the several offers of assistance in the event of a major Emergency in the Parish. Opinions gathered from the Parish Questionnaire were discussed at the Annual Parish Assembly in May.

Ideas and strategies suggested, in the event of a major emergency in the parish, ranged from physical support, comfort and help to transport and planning.

**Currently your Parish Council is very short handed – we urgently need two more members.** Sadly, because of this we are not able to manage all the projects we would like to - and Thornborough Community Resilience (emergency planning) is one of those things we cannot lead on at the current time.

More details are available for anyone wishing to take on this project. TPC is happy to discuss this further and can make information from the questionnaires available to those interested in taking this further.

#### Parish Asset Maintenance and Repairs

The approved priorities in the village for this year were the renovation of both village pumps; the memorial bench on the green in front of the school and the TPC noticeboard. Progress has been dogged by the relentless rain - the memorial bench and noticeboard work has now been completed. Weather permitting, the pumps are next in line as soon as the contractor is available. TPC has also funded various plumbing-related repairs at the Sir Harry Moore Sports Pavilion. Although the need to repair the felt on the Playground gazebo roof-wasn't anticipated, TPC approved the required funding.

#### **Artificial Wicket Approved**

The proposal developed by Thornborough Cricket Club (TCC) for the installation of an artificial wicket at the Sir Harry Moore Sports Field was approved by TPC at its recent meeting. TPC congratulated TCC on the success it has had in building on the ECB Allstars and Dynomo schemes to establish its current extensive youth provision. TPC wishes TCC every success with securing the required grant funding for the artificial wicket. We also wish to publicly record our thanks to the TCC Groundsman for cutting the grass around the pavilion building – this task was previously undertaken by the preschool.

The three key speakers at the AGM focused on Domestic Violence and Coercive control; Nazir Afzal OBE, Melanie Brown aka Scary Spice and Timothy Watson who played Rob Titchener, Archers in the high-profile domestic abuse storyline between 2013 and 2016. The speakers were both excellent and thought provoking.

At our June meeting Steve Wilkins spoke on 'Wine beyond the Label'. Who knew Dom Perignon was a Monk, one of the many interesting facts Steve conveyed over the course of his talk which was followed by a very nice chilled Chapel Down Rose, to be recommended.

In July our very own Jo Bursell spoke on "Centaurs, Oracles and Byzantines a Fortnight In Greece" She brought along a relic from this trip. Jo is a fascinating speaker who really knows her subject and brought it to life. August usually takes the form of a garden party visit. This year we hope to visit Kathy Browns amazing garden at Stevington, albeit in September! We also have our monthly meeting 6<sup>th</sup> September where Ian Scott-Hunter will share his memories of being a royal footman and we are assured he will discreet loyal and humorous.
