Reflections from the Rectory by Rev'd Jacqueline Dove

What a difference a day makes! I write this the day after the announcement of another national lock down. I spent yesterday putting together an Order of Service for the act of Remembrance taking place at the War Memorials in the four villages I serve. Since arriving here I have felt the need to sprint to try and catch up with where I would like to be as I missed out on planning ahead. Now I need to slam on breaks it seems.

The days between November 1st and 11th are a season of national remembering, when people move from thinking about personal losses through to remembering those who have died serving their country. In the Church we start with *All Saints Day* on the 1st November, when we remember those who have inspired us by their acts of compassion and courage, as well as those quietly in the background enabling others to do great things. This COVID pandemic has revealed that there are many living saints (heroes) in our midst.

The 2^{nd} November is *All Souls*, when we remember those we love who are no longer with us. In St Mary's Church, this year there will be tealights available from 2^{nd} November till the 11^{th} November for people to come and light a candle. There will also be hearts which you can place on a tree, with the name of the person you are remembering.

This time of remembering and mourning is made even more important by the Coronavirus pandemic, which is resulting in many thousands of deaths across the UK, in addition to the usual 600,000 per annum. Lots of people are grieving - much of this grief will be complicated as the usual support structures have been restricted.

I recently came across *The Bereavement Journey* which is a 6 week course which Churches across the country offer at this time to people who have been bereaved in the last five years. In October 2020, its founder, Jane Oundjian, has been awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours List. Its key premise is that when we embrace our bereavement, we grow rather than shrink. Grief itself can enable us to become a saint/hero as it can enlarge our hearts.

Remembering the journey Mary & Joseph took all those years ago, the uncertainty and fear they must have felt in trying to find somewhere to stay is not dissimilar to the fear and uncertainty we are experiencing today. Fear, uncertainty and anxiety has always been with us but listen to what Jesus has to say to us: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7). And in Matthew 11:28-30 he says to us "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." Take Jesus at his word – he won't let you down.

Act of Remembrance Sunday 8th November at 10.55am

On behalf of all in Thornborough, a very short Act of Remembrance will take place on Remembrance Sunday within government guidelines. No service is permitted in the Church. Wreaths will be laid (involving only two people at any given time) by representatives of the Thornborough and Thornton WI, the Parish Council, the Methodist Chapel and the Church.

The roll of honour will be read, the last post sounded, two minutes silence observed and a short prayer said.

Plans are being made to livestream the event to allow vulnerable persons to be part of the occasion and to demonstrate we are trying to restrict the number of those attending per the Government's guidelines.

Social distancing must be maintained at all times.

St Mary's Church - Services and events



Firstly, a huge thank you to all those who have supported the sale of goods in the church porch throughout the year. Both those people who have kindly donated a wonderful array of produce, and other items. Also, our thanks go to those who have purchased them.

Also, may we thank those who have decorated the church so beautifully for Harvest, and those who have helped to keep the churchyard maintained.

Monthly services had resumed, with the now required social distancing, for a little while now, and with a good attendance. However, due to the latest changes, and reinstated lockdown measures, that have been announced with regards to COVID19, the church will now only remain open for funerals and for individual private prayer. Formal services are now back in abeyance until at least the 2nd of December.

When services do finally resume a revised order of the services throughout the Blackthorn Chase Benefice will be put in place.

On Remembrance Sunday this year we (as with all other churches throughout England) will not be able to have a service. Nevertheless, Thornborough church will remain open for private prayer and lighting of candles for those who wish to do so. Tealights will be made available within the church from the 2nd of November.

On another, and more pleasant point; even though we were unable to hold a Harvest festival service in the church a short service, with people well separated was held outside the church followed by a parade of tractors around the village finishing by the village green.

A total of 250 cans of produce, and over £90 were donated for those in need.

Christmas Services and Celebrations

St Mary's is exploring in consultation with the Methodist Chapel ways we can celebrate Christmas in creative ways outside. For example:

- 2. **Lessons and Carols Community Walk.** Laminated sheets tied to trees or lampposts or on wooden posts hammered into the ground each sheet to include a Bible lesson and a carol with a QR code that takes you to a YouTube recording of the carol
- 3. Stations of the Nativity.

If the lockdown is lifted there will be some services in Church, although numbers will necessarily be limited to maintain social distancing.

Gateway to Local Art in Thornborough By Michael Synnott, Little Ash House, Thornborough

I was not long in Thornborough when I first came across the unique artistic delights to be found at the Capel family farm, just off Nash Road. A city boy from way back, I had naively assumed that the countryside was for pleasurable rural walks but art was something to be found in formal galleries in the city. Imagine my delight then, to discover in the meadows of the Capel family farm, that I could combine a delightful stroll with a stimulating example of community arts & crafts.

Nestling in the pastural landscape, visitors are charmed and intrigued by 20 or so, highly individualistic wrought iron gates crafted by George Capel at various times since the 1950s. From a chance meeting with the maker, I learned that upon his return from war time service as an RAF pilot, Mr. Capel recommenced his education in the evening at the Royal Latin school.



Here he acquired his understanding of the decorative and ornate capacities of wrought iron which are now so attractively embodied in the gates around his farm.

According to Mr Capel, none of the gates was designed on paper prior to starting work. Instead, he relied on spontaneous inspiration while working with the metal. The result is a delightful mixture of playful cartoon figures and representations from nature. At one moment the visitor is confronted with a sun rise or a smiling bugs bunny character. But then, a little bit further on, we encounter beautiful representations of foliage and flora.

William Morris, the founder of the English Arts and Crafts movement in the mid-19th century, advised crafters working with natural forms "...to combine clearness of form and firmness of structure with the mystery which comes of abundance and richness of detail". I think Mr. Morris would have enjoyed a visit to George Capel's farm.





My only concern is that these authentic examples of local arts and craft are already beginning to show signs of nature's wear and tear. It would indeed be a great pity and a loss if this lovely collection were ever to fade away.

Help Super Fast Broadband Come to Thornborough NOW

- ✓ Frustrated by outages and unreliable internet connections and speeds?
- ✓ Working from home more and need reliable Zoom/Microsoft Teams/Video calls connections?
- ✓ Angry with the slow broadband speeds compared to other villagers, towns and cities whilst paying the same charges?
- ✓ Hoping that Openreach may one day provide Super Fast Broadband?
- ✓ Want to maximise the value of your house?

Well there's good news!! You can help get Super Fast Broadband into Thornborough for no commitment today, likely no installation costs and only a 12 month commitment when installed (hopefully within 6 months).

Simply register your interest for up to 1000mbps full fibre broadband via the Ecom Fibre website (www.ecomfibre.co.uk) or, for the more tech savvy of you, "snap" on the QR code on the cover of TNews.

A project is underway to take advantage of UK Gov't and Buckinghamshire Council grants to fund the installation of full-fibre broadband in Thornborough and surrounding farms and houses. **But we must get as many registrations** of interest as we can - please persuade your friends and neighbours!!

Why do you need it?

We're all using the Internet more and more: for work, for fun and for education. The recent COVID crisis has made it even more important to use **Skype** or **FaceTime** to keep in touch with friends and family, **Zoom** or **Microsoft Teams** to work from home; **Spotify**, **YouTube**, **Netflix** or **BBC iPlayer** for entertainment



and crucially **Google Classroom** to educate our children remotely. We rely on the Internet and a **fast, reliable** service is essential. As technology improves, we will also all need even **faster**



broadband too: streaming in HD video needs at least 4Mbps but

4K/UHD requires **15Mbps**. Despite this many of our neighbours struggle to have any usable Internet at all: in the village, close to the cabinet in Lower End we can enjoy **80Mbps** connection speed but outside the village, many houses struggle with only **4Mbps** and are unable to access even basic services.

Isn't Super Fast Fibre here already?

No! The current service (**Fibre To The Cabinet or "FTTC"**) initially transformed broadband services in the village when it finally arrived in 2015. Thornborough was late in the roll-out because we are rural and therefore **not a priority** for Openreach. FTTC relies on the old copper cables originally installed for telephones to bring the broadband service to your house: that was installed decades ago and will **always be a bottleneck** as to how fast the service can run. Also, it's susceptible to problems because it was never really intended to carry data - cable joins, damp, interference etc all affect **Internet speed and reliability** of connection.

Fibre To The Premises is now the answer - by running a fibre directly from the Openreach cabinet to your home or business you can be certain you have a **future-proof Internet connection** that won't be affected by climate conditions or drop out every time someone in the house uses an old electric motor and we will be able to move up to at least **1,000Mbps** when we need Internet that fast. You might not feel you need it now but it's an investment for your home and the community.

What can we do? What's the plan?

There are **currently** generous grant vouchers available to run new fibre networks, **some on a first come first served basis**, **hence the need to act now.**

For every successful **home** application vouchers are available as follows:

- Government voucher £1,500 "Buckingham" voucher £2,000 For every successful small or medium business application the following:
 - Government voucher £3,500 "Buckingham" voucher £3,500

If sufficient voucher applications are made, this will enable local company Ecom to install the fibre network for free. But the Buckinghamshire Council funding is on a first come, first served basis whilst the current Government funding scheme only runs until the end of 2021. We need to move quickly to get the full benefit of this money. Ecom has registered their intent to fibre Thornborough and has applied to the Government for us to be included in the voucher scheme, but they need to ensure there is enough interest from the local homes and businesses. So, as many people as possible need to register their interest to receive the service to maximise our chances. PLEASE REGISTER!!

There is **no commitment, nothing to pay** and you only need to provide your **address, phone number and email address** at this stage.

With enough registrations, **Ecom** will contact everyone to explain the next steps. **You can register in less than a minute by visiting www.ecomfibre.co.uk** or **scanning the QR code** on the front page onto your smartphone.

Who are Ecom?

Ecom are a local company (based in Creslow nr. Whitchurch) and they have undertaken a number of fibre to the property rollouts already (Whitchurch and Wingrave are their biggest... but they have also completed others, a total of 6 villages, comprising 15-620 properties each).

Which houses are included?

The plan is for Thornborough and as many of the houses in the surrounding area as possible - the more people register now the better the chance we have of including everyone. So register now and help everyone in your community.

What's the cost?

Cable installation will be **FREE** IF enough villagers register.

Ecom provide 300mbps for £36 a month with landline included. You only have to commit to a single 12-month contract **IF** you wish to proceed in due course.

How do I register?

Simply go onto the Ecom Fibre website (<u>www.ecomfibre.co.uk</u>) and enter your postcode in the box, click search, select your address, click submit, click "register now", **provide an email address, name & phone number** & SAVE/SUBMIT.

What's in it for me?

Fast reliable internet access! This will at least quadruple your speed! Fast Internet is also essential for most house buyers and **every doubling of speed increased house value by 3%.** No more paying for that copper landline anymore and help support local businesses that rely on the Internet. **We particularly need the village to join in to help the wider community get connected.**

associated with the generation of electricity. She talked about her career as a female engineer. A job that had taken her all over the world. Amazing slides, excellent content that stimulated our members to ask many questions. Jo also included some information about our local solar farm at Thornborough grounds as she had inspected it. Its 5mW and can power 1,500 homes.

October brought us a thoroughly enjoyable insight into Julie Grose's life as a sculptural designer and a lady Blacksmith. She showed us beautiful slides of her amazing creations and gave an entertaining talk. This was first time she had given a presentation via Zoom. November is, of course, our AGM which will be followed by a talk about the pioneering adventures of the first women professionals, given recently at the Buckinghamshire History Festival. Our December meeting will be something Christmassy and crafty. Details to follow.

We have also had social gatherings too. In September Rev Jacqueline Dove, our new vicar, introduced herself and gave us an insight into her journey to Thornborough via 5 other countries. Hedgerow spirit making

We are unable to host our annual event this year due to Covid restrictions. So here are two recipes to follow if you'd like to make your own hedgerow spirits. If you haven't been able to collect any hedgerow fruits, e.g. sloes, blackberries or blackcurrants, do contact us and they can be supplied to you.





Hedgerow Spirit

250g sugar to 500g fruit to 1 litre spirit or equivalent ratios

The Sipsmith process for sloe gin

- 1. Harvest sloes when ripe, freeze for a minimum of 24 hours
- 2. Fill a wide-mouthed lidded jar halfway with frozen sloes
- 3. Add gin to the jar, fill to the top. Turn the jar a couple of times.
- 4. After 3 months take a sample out to taste
- 5. Strain the sloe gin and add sugar syrup (recipe below) a little at a time until it reaches your preferred sweetness

One of the common complaints about standard sloe recipes is that some years they produce a too-sweet liqueur, while other years they are not sweet enough. Sweetening to taste at the end of the maceration yields a perfect batch every time. If you use simple syrup instead of granulated sugar, you don't have to wait for the crystals to dissolve.

The Sipsmith syrup recipe

Combine equal measures of sugar & water in a saucepan over a low heat. Warm the mixture until the sugar dissolves, then allow it to cool. If you prefer a higher-strength sloe gin make the syrup with 3 parts sugar and 2 parts water to reduce the dilution. Be sure only to add a little syrup at first, as it sometimes requires only a fraction of the quantity of sugar called for in standard recipes.

Thornborough Parish Council (TPC) Report

TPC met remotely on Monday 21 September and Thursday 15 October 2020.

Planning

At the meeting in September, TPC dealt with five planning applications. The most significant of these were:

- 20/02810/APP Faccenda Chicken Thornhill Poultry Farm Demolition of 11 no. existing poultry houses and erection of 2 no. replacement poultry houses and associated infrastructure.
- 20/02771/APP Faccenda Chicken Thornhill Poultry Farm Change of use of land to permit the creation of a container storage facility. (Subsequently withdrawn.)

TPC agreed to oppose both planning applications because of concerns about increased traffic and pollution; the adverse impact on the local community and the rural countryside. TPC did not object to the other three planning applications which involved improvements to homes in the village.

At the October meeting, TPC considered the White Paper Planning for the Future and agreed to respond to the consultation fully supporting the response prepared by Buckinghamshire Council. TPC is a member of the North Buckinghamshire Parishes Planning Consortium (NBPCC) which also submitted a robust response to the White Paper consultation drawing on the views of its member councils.

Finance Group

A Finance Group has been appointed to advise TPC and provide a more robust approach to:

- The annual budget building and precept setting processes.
- Ongoing budget monitoring and forecasting.
- The parish assets, maintenance and, where appropriate, replacement.
- Actively explore opportunities for TPC to increase its financial and other resources through grants, sponsorship, donations, etc.

The Finance Group will be chaired by the Clerk, as Responsible Financial Office. Its members comprise: Cllrs Taylor, Tribe and Williamson.

The Playground

A heartfelt and public enormous thank you to the parent group who worked with TPC to enable the playground to be 'Covid secured' and reopened in time for the summer holiday. Going forward this volunteer group will undertake the monthly playground safety checks which are required by TPC's insurers. In addition to these monthly checks, RoSPA undertakes an annual inspection for

the annual safety report. Semi-permanent Covid-19 playground signs will shortly replace the laminated signs because they are unable to withstand the bad weather.

Buckingham and Villages Community Board (B&VCB)

The establishment of Buckinghamshire Council as a unitary authority included replacing the former local areas forums (LAFs) with 16 community boards. TPC comes under the remit of B&VCB and is represented on it by Cllr Tribe. TPC has recently applied for permission and 2021/22 financial year funding to address the parking problem by the Sir Harry Moore Sports Field and Pavilion. Currently Pre School parents have no choice but to park on the verge when delivering and collecting their children. During the winter and other periods of bad weather the verge becomes churned-up with thick mud which is rutted and extremely slippery. If successful, the application to B&VCB will grant permission and match funding towards the installation of a dropped curb between the road and the verge, and the installation of grasscrete with associated drainage on the verge to provide safe parking.

Next Meeting

The next TPC meeting is on Monday 16 November 2020, commencing at 7pm. There is no December meeting. Meetings will continue to be held remotely until further notice. Instructions on how members of the public can attend a remote meeting are published in the meeting agenda on the TPC noticeboard and website. TPC uses Zoom as its remote meeting platform which allows members of the public to join by phone if they prefer or don't have internet access.


